

Description of corner evidence found:
No physical evidence of the corner monument or accessory was found.

Description of monument and accessories I established to perpetuate the original location of this corner:

By survey, we establish the original corner point by reference to the original survey ties to Cabin Creek. Refer to the Map of Survey being filed concurrently with this record for additional information. In this area, Cabin Creek is defined and contained within the walls of a narrow and rocky canyon.

At the true corner point, which is located on a steep west slope of bedrock outcroppings, we drive a $5 / 8^{\prime \prime} \times 30^{\prime \prime}$ Iron rod into a crack in the bedrock, with yellow plastic cap attached, marked "AP\&A" (The Iron Rod is slanted to the East, the top of the rod is at the corner point). From which:

A 12" Ponderosa Pine, scribed "T2N R39E S2 BT" on a double blaze bears $\mathrm{S} 21^{\circ} \mathrm{W} 29.3$ feet,

And a 12" Douglas Fir, scribed "T3N R39E S36 BT" on a double blaze, bears $\mathrm{N} 63^{\circ} \mathrm{E} 11.0$ feet.

Attached brass washer marked "LS 1099" to lower blaze of new BT's
No other suitable trees near.

## HISTORY OF ORIGINAL CORNER ESTABLISHED:

Corner originally established by Rufus S. Moore under GLO Contract No
382, dated March 23, 1881. Survey General States: N 890 $45^{\prime}$ E on the North boundary of Section 2, T2N, R39E 78.40 chains - Cabin Creek, 20 lks. wide, runs South.
80.00 chains - basalt stone $14 \times 12 \times 4$ ins. in mound of stone for cor. to Secs. 1 and 2, from which:
A Pine 24 " diam. bears $S 20^{\circ} \mathrm{W} 53$ lks. dist.
Original subdivisional survey of T2N R39E by Rufus Moore, 1881, states:
S $0^{\circ} 49^{\prime}$ E on a true line between Secs. 1 and 2
5.60 chains - Cabin Creek 20 lks wide, runs SE

In 1985, Gary Langlitz, in Survey No. 14-85 establishes the original corner point by reference to the original survey ties to Cabin Creek. Survey Record States:

At the true corner point, which is located on a steep west slope of bedrock outcroppings, we drive a $5 / 8^{\prime \prime} \times 30^{\prime \prime}$ Iron rod into a crack in the bedrock, with yellow plastic cap attached, marked "AP\&A" (The Iron Rod is slanted to the East, the top of the rod is at the corner point). From which:
A 12" Ponderosa Pine, scribed "T2N R39E S2 BT" on a double blaze,
bears $\mathrm{S} 21^{\circ} \mathrm{W} 29.3$ feet,
And a 12" Douglas Fir, scribed "T3N R39E S36 BT" on a double blaze, bears N63E 11.0 feet.

## DESCRIPTION OF CORNER EVIDENCE FOUND:

Found a 5/8" iron pin with a deteriorated yellow plastic cap 3" above ground out of bedrock. Iron pin is slightly bent and leaning to the west. From which:

A 17" Douglas Fir bears $N 63^{\circ}$ E, a distance of 10.50 feet alive and vigorous with a healed blaze.
A 17" Ponderosa Pine bears $S 19^{\circ} \mathrm{W}$, a distance of 29.30 feet alive and vigorous with a healed blaze.

## DESCRIPTION OF MONUMENT AND ACCESSORIES I ESTABLISHED

## TO PERPETUATE THE ORIGINAL LOCATION OF THIS CORNER:

I replace the deteriorated yellow plastic cap with a $2^{1 / 2 \prime}$ aluminum cap marked as shown below, raised a mound of stone 1 foot diameter to the top of cap. From which:

NEW BEARING OBJECTS:
A 18" Douglas Fir bears $S 41^{\circ}$ E, a distance of 19.85 feet, marked T2N R39E S1 BT. A 20" Douglas Fir bears $N 22^{\circ} \mathrm{W}$, a distance of 27.65 feet, marked T3N R39E S35 BT.

I used a steel tape and magnetic compass in the establishment of the new accessories. I used $16^{\circ}$ East declination, the distances are to a 60d spike driven into the right side of the root crown of the new bearing trees. A brass washer marked OPLS 83571 is attached to the BT blaze of the new bearing trees.
