History of original corner establishment:
Corner monumented by F. W. Campbell in 1884 under contract No. 498, set a 10" X $8^{\prime \prime}$ X $8^{\prime \prime}$ basalt stone $8^{\prime \prime}$ in the ground, marked $1 / 4$ on West face. $6^{\prime \prime}$ diam. Spruce, East, 19 links, mkd. 14 SBT. 11" Diam. Spruce, S. $70^{\circ} \mathrm{W} ., 21$ links, mkd. 1/4SBT.

Description of corner evidence found:
10" X $8^{\prime \prime}$ X $8^{\prime \prime}$ stone with $1 / 4$ scribe on West face, set firmly in place. Stump hole, East, 19 links. Stump hole, S. $70^{\circ}$ W., 21 links.

Description of monument and accessories I established to perpetuate the original location of this corner:
Set a $2 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ Diam. brass cap in a 2 " X $30^{\prime \prime}$ iron pipe at the Corner and buried Cornerstone alongside pipe.
