

## History of original corner establishment:

T5SR41E
The corner was originally established by Henry M. Thatcher, U. S. Deputy Surveyor, Contract Number 320, during 1879. His record states:
"Set stone $11 \times 9 \times 7$ for $1 / 4$ Sec. Cor. Raised stone mound at Cor."
1975, William W. Briggs, P.E. No. 3780, J-U-B Engineers, Inc., conducted a dependent resurvey of Sec. 7, county survey record No. 16-75, 17-75, \& remonumentation record No. 715-84R, his record states:
"fd. mound of rocks with center stone measures 11 " x 7 " $\times 9$ "..."
"...Set brass cap in concrete in center of rock mound. Set steel fence post along side. Blazed and scribed bearing trees:
$10^{\prime \prime}$ Ponderosa Pine, bears N18 ${ }^{\circ}$ E, 28.40 feet.
17 " Ponderosa Pine, bears S77E, 44.15 feet."
1991, Philip G. Griffin, Cadastral Surveyor, BLM, conducted a dependent resurvey in this township and accepted this corner as perpetuated by Briggs, his record states:
"...monumented with a brass cap, 3 ins. diam., firmly set in concrete, with top mkd." (as shown in the diagram above),
"from which the remains of bearing trees mkd. by Briggs
A sawed pine stump, 13 ins. diam., bears N. $18^{\circ}$ E., 42 lks . dist., with scribe marks S6 BT on loose piece of wood alongside.

A ponderosa pine, 22 ins. diam., bears S. $761 / 2^{\circ}$ E., 66 lks . dist., with scribe marks S7 BT legible on pitched over blaze.
and a new bearing tree
A ponderosa pine, 17 ins. diam., bears N. $26^{\circ}$ E., 88 lks . dist., mkd. 1/4 S6 BT."
1995, Russell T. Pinard, LS 958, Oregon State Parks, conducted a dependent resurvey and retracement of a portion of Sec. 7, county survey record No. 30-95, his record states:
"FOUND MONUMENT 3-1/2" BRASS CAP IN CONCRETE MARKED ‘R.P.E. NO. 3780’".
Description of corner evidence found:
Found corner monumented with a brass cap, 3 ins. diam., firmly set in concrete, with top mkd. as shown in the diagram above,
from which bearing trees mkd. by Briggs
A sawed pine stump, 13 ins. diam., bears N. $18^{\circ}$ E., 27.9 ft . dist. ( 27.7 ft . Griffin), with scribe marks S6 BT on loose piece of wood alongside.

A ponderosa pine, 22 ins. diam., bears S. $761 / 2^{\circ}$ E., 43.7 ft . dist. ( 43.6 ft . Griffin), with scribe marks S7 BT legible on pitched over blaze.
and bearing tree mkd. by Griffin
A ponderosa pine, 17 ins. diam., bears N. $26^{\circ}$ E., 57.8 ft . dist. ( 58.1 ft . Griffin), mkd. $1 / 4 \mathrm{~S} 6 \mathrm{BT}$ visible in partially healed blaze.

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## Description of monument and accessories I established to perpetuate the original location of this corner:

From the brass cap, I established the following references:
Nailed a brass washer marked LS 2211 to the top of the sawed pine stump, (Briggs' NE bearing tree).

A ponderosa pine 12 ins. diam., bears S. $20^{\circ}$ E., 46.2 ft . dist., marked $1 / 4 \mathrm{~S} 7 \mathrm{BT}$ with a brass washer marked LS 2211, nailed between the B \& T.

I set a galvanized steel post, Easterly on the property line, 3.3 ft . dist., with a Property Boundary sign attached, I also set a galvanized steel post, Southerly on the property line, 4.3 ft . dist., with a Property Boundary \& a Land Survey Monument sign attached.

There is a corner of a barbed wire fence, about S. $30^{\circ} \mathrm{E} ., 10$ feet from this corner, extending east \& north.
This corner is visible from the south end of the northern most parking lot of the picnic area of Catherine Creek State Park.

## HISTORY OF ORIGINAL CORNER ESTABLISHED:

Corner originally established by H. M. Thatcher under GLO
Contract No. 320, dated April 1, 1879. Surveyor General field notes state:

Set stone $11 \times 9 \times 7$ for $1 / 4 \mathrm{sec}$. Cor. Raised stone mound at Cor
In Survey No. 16-75, William Briggs finds mound of rock with stone of called size, and sets a brass cap in concrete in center of rock mound (Union County Monumentation record No. 715-84R). From which, new bearing trees:

A $10^{\prime \prime}$ Ponderosa Pine, bears $\mathrm{N} 18^{\circ} \mathrm{E}, 28.40$ feet.
A 17" Ponderosa Pine, bears $577^{\circ} \mathrm{E}, 44.15$ feet.
In 1991, Philip G. Griffin finds a brass cap firmly set in concrete, marked as shown below. From which:

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A sawed pine stump, 13 ins. diam., bears N. $18^{\circ}$ E., 42 lks. dist., with
cribe marks S6 BT on loose piece of wood alongside.
A ponderosa pine, 22 ins. diam., bears S. $763{ }^{3}{ }^{\circ}$ E., 66 lks. dist., with scribe marks S 7 BT on pitched over blaze.
New bearing tree:
A ponderosa pine, 17 ins. diam., bears N. $26^{\circ}$ E., 88 lks. dist., mkd. 1/4 S6 BT.
In 1995, Russell T. Pinard finds monument as described. See County Survey No. 30-95.
In 1998, Roger Green finds monument as described, and perpetuates it as follows.
From the brass cap, Nailed a brass washer marked LS 2211 to the top of the sawed pine stump.
A ponderosa pine 12 ins. diam., bears. S. $20^{\circ}$ E., 46.2 ft. dist., marked $1 / 4 \mathrm{~S} 7 \mathrm{BT}$ with a brass washer marked LS 2211, nailed between $B \& T$.

Corner found and accepted by Rick Robinson in Survey No. 031-2000

## DESCRIPTION OF CORNER EVIDENCE FOUND:

Found a $3^{\prime \prime}$ brass cap set flush in concrete, marked as shown below. From which:
A 21 inch Ponderosa Pine bears $N 23^{\circ} \mathrm{E}$, a distance of 57.80 feet, alive and vigorous with a healed blaze.
A 24 inch Ponderosa Pine bears $S 82^{\circ} \mathrm{E}$, a distance of 43.70 feet, alive and vigorous with a healed blaze.
A 13 inch Ponderosa Pine bears $S 26^{\circ} \mathrm{E}$, a distance of 46.20 feet, alive and vigorous with scribe marks visible on partially healed blaze.

## NEW BEARING TREE:

A 22 inch Ponderosa Pine bears $\mathrm{S} 52^{\circ} \mathrm{W}$, a distance of 37.05 feet, marked 1/4 S7 BT.

I used a steel tape and magnetic compass in the establishment of the new accessory. I used $16^{\circ}$ East declination, the distances are to a 60d spike driven into the right side of the root crown of the new bearing tree. A brass washer marked OPLS 83571 is attached to the BT blaze of the new bearing tree.
